4 EASY STEPS TO MAKE YOUR VOICE HEARD

- 1 If you aren't already registered, it's easy to <u>do online</u>, but it must be done by Monday, December 7!
 - Note voter registration is only available for federal run-offs. You must have been registered by the Oct. 5th deadline to participate in state run-offs.
- ²You can also update your voter registration through Dec. 7th. You may want to be registered to vote where you will be living on Jan. 5th. If you are registered to vote at an address where you will not be located on Jan. 5th you will need to request an absentee ballot or physically return there to vote in-person.
- (3) Decide which voting option you prefer:
 - Early in-person voting days and times may vary by location, but early voting will start on December 14. Find times and nearby locations <u>here</u>.
 - Absentee Ballot request a ballot immediately <u>online</u> or <u>download a ballot</u> <u>application</u> and email it back as an attachment or drop it off in-person.
 - Though you may request a ballot by January 1 by 5pm, you may not receive the ballot on time if you wait until then.
 - Once you get your ballot, follow the instructions exactly when filling it out and preparing to return it, either via postal mail or drop it off at a designated drop-box (check locations with your <u>county registrar's office</u>).
 - Confirm that you must use ballot drop in your county of registration.
 - November 18 is the first day that ballots will be mailed out by election officials.
 - It's recommended that you drop off, rather than mail-in your ballot, if it's 10 days or less before the election.
 - ∘ In-person voting on January 5 find your poll location <u>here</u>.
